SAFETY AND UPKEEP TIP



Carbon monoxide alarms are a very good safety feature for everyone to have. A CO alarm detects dangerous levels of carbon monoxide, which is a colorless, odorless, and tasteless gas that is poisonous. Wall-mounted sealed battery-operated CO alarms and plug-in alarms with battery backup can be purchased at hardware stores, home centers, electrical supply stores, and elsewhere — just make sure it's a UL listed product. The Underwriters Laboratories logo is found on common household items and the logo features a "UL" inside a black circle. It is recommended that a CO alarm be placed outside of sleeping areas. If you need help installing your CO alarm, ask the maintenance staff.

TECHNOLOGY AND ENVIRONMENT TIP



Recycling Mixed Paper Tip: Montgomery County requires us to recycle mixed paper. There are recycling bins next to the trash chutes on each floor. Place all mixed paper in the blue bin with the slotted cover.

Boxes that do not fit into the blue bin must be broken down and put in the recycling bin on G-3. Please do not leave boxes on the floor in the Trash/Recycle room.

Larger boxes that do not fit in the blue bin must be broken down and taken to the Garage Level 3 cardboard bin. G-3 also has a dumpster for general trash. Please do not put cardboard into garbage dumpster or leave boxes on the floor.

There are recycling posters above the recycling bins in the Trash/Recycle room. Below is a list of the types of mixed paper that can be recycled:

- Cardboard (Cardboard boxes must be clean and dry. Do not recycle pizza or other boxes that contain food or are greasy)
- Cereal boxes (Remove liner and breakdown the boxes)
- Coated-paper items such as milk and juice cartons, juice and drink boxes, frozen food boxes, and ice cream cartons. (Remember to remove plastic caps and throw them away and rinse out all cartons)
- Computer and office paper
- Hardcover books
- Magazines / Catalogs
- Newspaper / Inserts
- Paperback books

- Pasta boxes (Break down the boxes)
- Shredded paper (Shredded paper must be placed in a paper bag and stapled shut)
- Telephone books
- Unwanted mail (Check to make sure there are no hard plastic cards inside)
- All other clean dry paper (Do not recycle paper towels, only the cardboard tube inside)
